The monsoon has begun, with the season running each year from June 15 - Sept. 30. While we all appreciate and welcome the rain, the monsoon can produce weather that causes damage and destruction.

Many City of Phoenix departments play a vital role before, during, and after a storm to ensure residents, businesses, and visitors are safe and prepared.

This special edition of the PHXConnect newsletter will showcase some of that work and help inform you on what other departments are working on. It will also inform you on how to stay healthy sand safe with our extreme heat days.

## **DO YOUR PART**

Visibility during a monsoon storm can be limited as storms and flash flooding can strike fast. If conditions warrant, find a safe place to park and wait it out. If on a freeway:

- 1. Pull off to the right
- 2. Turn your lights off
- 3. Set your parking brake, and keep your feet off the pedals.

During and after a monsoon storm, it's important to pay attention to traffic signs. **Never cross a flooded wash or road**.



# **DISCONNECT YOUR TECH**

During the extreme summer heat, help conserve

electricity by turning off and unplugging all nonessential items (fans, lamps, radios, etc.) at your desk when not in use, especially over weekends




and during any time off. Please **DO NOT** unplug desktop computers, monitors, or docking stations; they must be plugged in to run automatic updates.

# WATCHING THE WATER

The Water Department's Environmental Services Division intensifies monitoring of stormwater runoff and educates the public about stormwater pollution to reduce environmental contamination.






### **IT'S STILL VERY HOT**

Even though the monsoon brings lots of wind and rain, it's still very hot—and we encourage everyone to continue to be vigilant about staying hydrated.

# **AVOIDING OUTDOORS**

Even when an excessive heat warning is not in effect, the summer weather can still be dangerous. If you must be outdoors try to limit activities to the cooler parts of the day.

To stay cool and keep hydrated, the Heat Relief Network offers free water and indoor cooling center locations throughout the city and some with extended hours to cool off for anyone needing to get out of the heat. If you need a ride to a cooling center, call 2-1-1.

# **MEDICATION VS. HEAT**

If you take medications regularly or have an existing medical condition, make sure to consult your healthcare provider on your heat risk. Additionally, make sure to familiarize yourself with the signs of heat stroke and heat exhaustion.

## **RIDE SAFELY**

If you use your new Platinum card to ride Light Rail or a Valley Metro bus, a few simple tips to keep your travels trouble-free:

- 1) Bring plenty of water in a spill-proof bottle or container with a secure lid.
- 2) Bring a hat to wear while waiting for your ride to ensure you have shade the entire time.
- 3) Reduce wait times by tracking your trip with the Valley Metro app.
