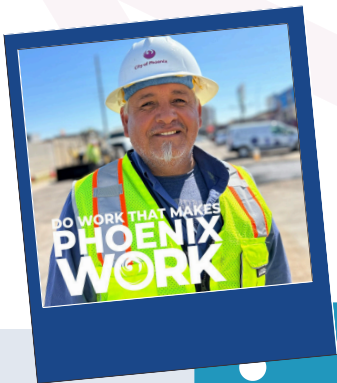
Please remember to obtain your supervisor's approval to attend events that occur during your normal work hours.

Monsoon Season is June 15 to Sept. 30. Always take the necessary precautions - on and off the clock - when it comes to monsoon weather and hazardous conditions.



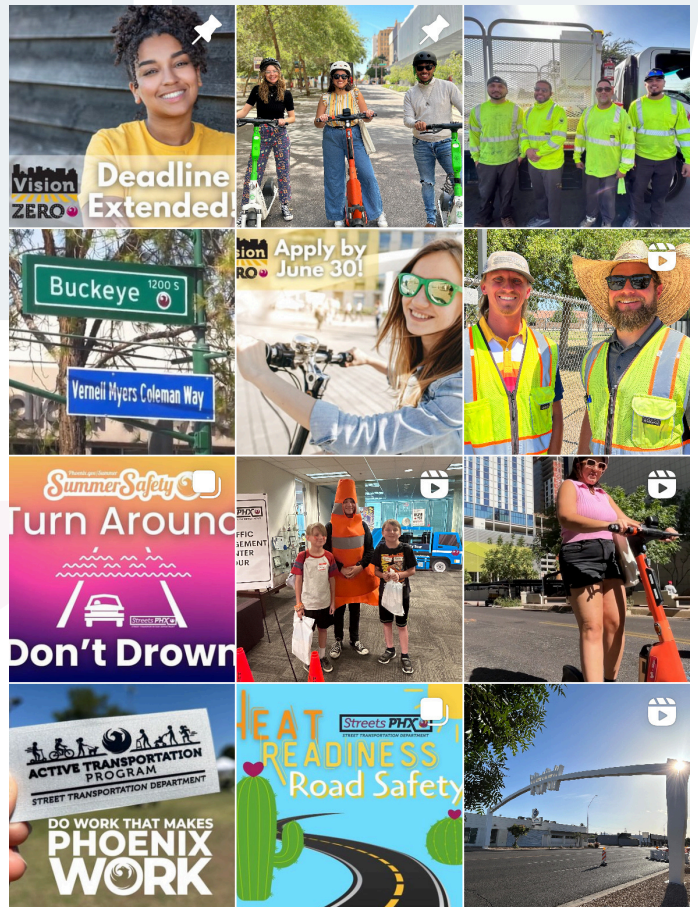

‘SUMMER SAFETY’ IS THE THEME!

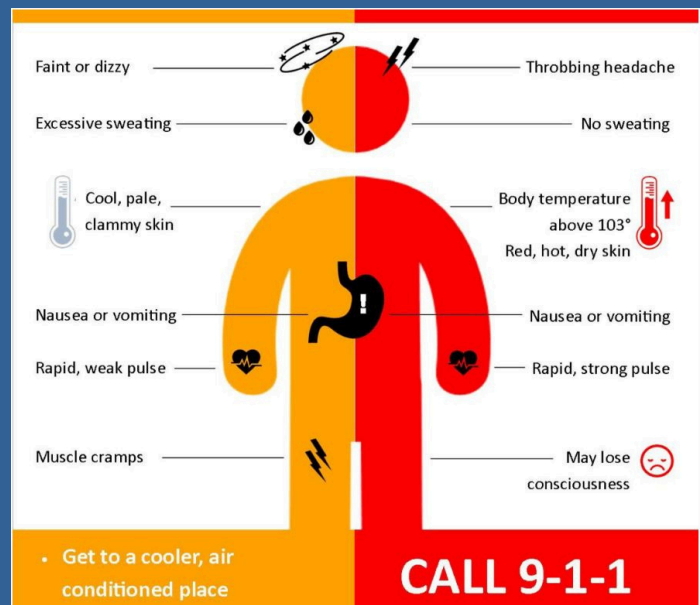


For the next few months, we will be posting and reminding people to exercise heat readiness and take the appropriate steps to avoid heat injury or illness!

The City of Phoenix has established the Heat Illness & Injury Prevention Program to minimize or eliminate employee exposure to heat related hazards that may lead to serious illnesses, injuries, or death. Our department will follow the components of this program from May 1 – September 30, or anytime a heat advisory or heat warning day has been issued by the National Weather Service.

Safety Tips for Heat and Hydration

- Know the signs of Heat Exhaustion and Heat Stroke.
- Drink more water than usual:
 - Avoid sugary drinks, alcohol and caffeine
- Take frequent breaks and wear light-colored clothing and wide-brimmed hats.
- Look after your fellow employees for signs and symptoms of potential heat injury.

Here are some highlights and accomplishments we've celebrated during the first part of the year.

DESIGN & CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT

WEST PHOENIX TRANSPORTATION STUDY

The West Phoenix Transportation Study has been completed, which analyzed existing streets for improving safety and addressing gaps in the mobility, transit and active transportation networks in an area bounded by 113th Avenue, 91st Avenue, McDowell Road, and Cardinals Way.

RIO REIMAGINED RIO SALADO BIKE/PED BRIDGE DESIGN CHARRETTE

The first dedicated bicycle and pedestrian bridge across the Rio Salado is in the design stages. Aiming for a safe and seamless crossing, the project held a design charrette in May. This collaborative event brought together various stakeholders to develop themes and refine the bridge design into three alternatives for public review. Participants included city departments and organizations like the Audubon Society and Rio Reimagined. They also brainstormed ideas for experiential and educational elements to be included in or around the bridge. There will be a public meeting July 9 at 5:00 p.m. at Burton Barr Central Library.



Community Engagement



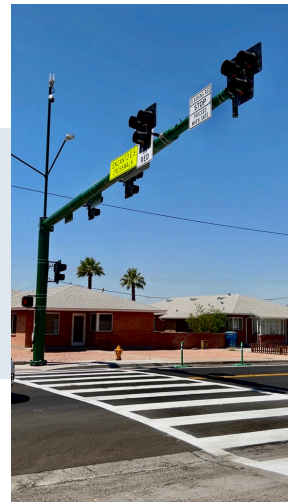
It was a great time getting a chance to meet employees' kids during Bring Your Child to Work Day on June 12!

MANAGEMENT SERVICES

With more than **700** pieces of property and facilities in **19** different locations, the creation of a new GIS (Geographic Information Services) layer has been implemented to track the properties that the Streets Department owns or is responsible for maintaining, making this tool essential for effectively monitoring the use and conditions of these properties, as well as, provide valuable assistance in addressing questions related to the use and sale of our properties and managing agreements with neighboring entities.

The GIS (Geographic Information Services), IT (Information Technology) and Administrative Services teams have developed comprehensive metrics that are now displayed on newly created dashboards, which have been posted on SharePoint to provide live updates on productivity in these areas.

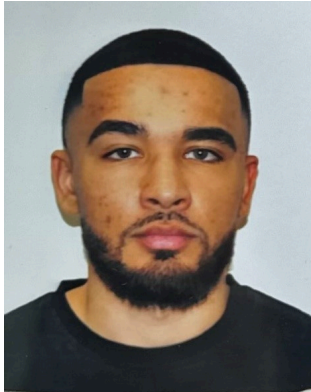
62 speed study reviews completed for communities pursuing speed humps and cushions
