We honor the memories of those who died in the attack, and the extraordinary heroism on display that fateful day by ordinary Americans helping their fellow Americans.





WHAT'S HAPPENING



Street Transportation staff are participating in the review process for the Downtown Redevelopment Area (RDA) Project draft compiled by the Community and Economic Development Department. In October 2020, and in conformance with State law, the City of Phoenix updated the RDA boundaries. The RDA is defined by the area generally bounded by 23rd Avenue, 16th Street, Durango Street, and Moreland Street. The plan is prepared in conformance with A.R.S. §36-1479, outlines strategies and actions to guide development, redevelopment, conservation, and preservation within the Downtown RDA. Staff reviewed and provided comments on the chapters of the plan that contain detail and recommendations on roadway infrastructure, mobility, active transportation, and vulnerable road user safety.


Staff recently attended a peer exchange workshop sponsored by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Region 9 for cities, towns, counties, and states.



Staff from FHWA Region 9 headquarters, FHWA Arizona Division, and Arizona Department of Transportation provided information on upcoming grant opportunities for U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) funding, offered guidance, and shared resources. Street staff presented information on the department's successful efforts in writing federal grant submittals and receiving USDOT funding from programs including Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE), Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A), and Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements (CRISI). The peer exchange workshop was a great opportunity to learn from other agencies and have insightful dialogue on federal grant opportunities, strategies, and best practices that all can benefit from sharing.



Our Streets team held a public meeting with members of the Maryvale community and the Camelback Community Neighborhood Association to kick off survey efforts on plans to modify the lane striping on Campbell Avenue between 59th Avenue and 51st Avenue.


Monsoon Season is June 15 to Sept. 30. Always take the necessary precautions - on and off the clock - when it comes to monsoon weather and hazardous conditions.



The City of Phoenix has established the Heat Illness & Injury Prevention Program to minimize or eliminate employee exposure to heat related hazards that may lead to serious illnesses, injuries, or death. Our department will follow the components of this program from May 1 – September 30, or anytime a heat advisory or heat warning day has been issued by the National Weather Service.

Safety Tips for Heat and Hydration

- Know the signs of Heat Exhaustion and Heat Stroke.
- Drink more water than usual:
 - Avoid sugary drinks, alcohol and caffeine
- Take frequent breaks and wear lightcolored clothing and wide-brimmed hats.
- Look after your fellow employees for signs and symptoms of potential heat injury.
