#### **Making Phoenix Cool**

Which is why Phoenix has a Tree and Shade Master Plan to double the number of trees in Phoenix and provide shade that, among other benefits, is making the city more walkable in those hot summer months. ## WHAT A GREAT CITY WE HAVE!

Reason to Celebrate: Thanks in part to community feedback and support, the Phoenix City Council unanimously approved an ambitious new goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 30 percent below 2012 levels by 2025!

In 2016, the Phoenix City Council adopted the goal to be a carbon-neutral city by 2060 and directed staff to complete a 2016 community greenhouse gas inventory. Earlier this year, Council reviewed the City's first-ever Community Greenhouse Gas Inventory (baseline from 2012) showing Phoenix to have a lower community-wide carbon intensity than many other leading U.S. Cities! This inventory helped to inform the mid-term 2025 greenhouse gas reduction target.

A component of the Council directive included community and stakeholder engagement, which included a public outreach campaign with staff presenting a wide range of potentially viable actions to the community, including City Boards and Commissions, Village Planning committees and various other stakeholders. This tool was used to identify support for a mix of potential voluntary and regulatory actions that could be considered in the future. Additional outreach efforts incorporated an extensive social media campaign on Facebook, Twitter, and NextDoor using the weblink <a href="http://www.coolerphoenix.com">http://www.coolerphoenix.com</a>, provided in both English and Spanish.

Highlights from just over 1,700 comments included:

- Overwhelming demonstration of public and stakeholder willingness to make personal commitments to achieve these goals
- Most respondents indicated a willingness to participate in a variety of suggested activities that could reduce greenhouse gas emission over the long term

#### **Support for Trees:**

- 91% agree: A strategy to double the number of trees in Phoenix over time is a good idea.
- 50% agree: I would consider donating to a citywide tree campaign in my city.

#### Support on Buildings:

- 83% agree: I think the City should require a green rating (called a HERS score) on all new homes, so that a house's efficiency is displayed clearly for potential buyers.
- 81% agree: I think the City adopting an energy efficient building code is a good idea (even if the new home costs slightly more).
- 71% agree: I would pay \$300 more for a home with Electric Vehicle Charging.

As we roll up our sleeves and dig into 2018, let's focus on the great things ahead: our sustainable future and the goals achieved along the way. What a great city we have!
