Having grass in your yard can lead to higher water bills. Keeping turf green year-round requires significant irrigation, especially during the hottest months.

To help residents and businesses save water and money, the City of Phoenix offers grass removal incentives. Participants can qualify for financial assistance by replacing grass with lowwater-use or desert-adapted landscaping. By removing grass, you can reduce your monthly water costs, enhance your property with sustainable plants, and support the community's ongoing efforts to conserve water during drought conditions.

### ADVANCED WATER PURIFICATION TAKES SHAPE AT CAVE CREEK



September marked one year of construction for the **Cave Creek Water Reclamation Plant** Rehabilitation Project, a key step in advancing **Pure Water Phoenix**, the City's program to create a new, renewable source of purified drinking water.

The project is on schedule, with demolition of outdated facilities complete and construction underway on modern, energy-efficient systems. When finished in 2027, the upgraded plant will feature **advanced water purification technology** capable of producing up to 7 million gallons of purified water per day, enough to serve about 25,000 households.

These improvements will enhance efficiency, reliability, and sustainability while supporting Phoenix's long-term water resiliency.



### DON'T 'FOG' UP YOUR HOLIDAY WITH A PLUMBING DISASTER



The holidays are a time for family, food, and celebration — not clogged pipes! As you cook heartier meals this season, remember to follow Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOG) Best Management Practices in your kitchen.

#### What is FOG?

FOG comes from everyday cooking ingredients like meat drippings, oil, butter, margarine, sauces, dairy, and even baked goods. When poured down the drain or into a garbage disposal, these substances can build up inside pipes and cause costly blockages in both your home's plumbing and the city's sewer system. Phoenix maintains nearly 4,800 miles of sewer pipes, so keeping them clear helps everyone.

### What happens when pipes get blocked?

Wastewater has nowhere to go and can back up into sinks, toilets, or even overflow into streets or alleys — a true holiday disaster.

### Be a Holiday Hero: Keep FOG Out of the Drain

- Pour used grease into a container, mix with coffee grounds or kitty litter, and throw it in the trash.
- Avoid or limit the use of garbage disposals; they do not prevent FOG from entering the sewer.
- Use drain screens to capture food particles and dispose of them in the garbage.
- Wipe and scrape dishes before washing to remove grease and solids.

Small changes make a big difference. Help keep Phoenix's sewer system flowing smoothly and your holidays worry-free.

### Plastic Bag Recycling Collection With Recyclops

It can be difficult to know what to do with plastic bags. While Phoenix does not accept plastic bags in the blue recycling bins because they can jam the sorting machines, there is still a way to keep them out of the landfill.

Residents can sign up for a subscription collection service with **Property Recyclops**, a third-party **Property Recyclops** Zero Waste Business certified by the Public Works Department.

Subscribers have their plastic bags collected monthly, right from their doorstep, and the material is remanufactured into new plastic products.
